

Berkshire Historic Churches Trust April 2025 THE Royal County of Berkshire Churches Trust was established in February 1984. In the last 40 years, the Trust has given over £750,000 of grants to support essential repairs and improvements to church buildings in the County - a significant sum, but a fraction of the total cost of these works. The Trust has continued to make grants to support repairs and new facilities, and would welcome applications from any church in the county which is planning such work. We can now give small grants to help with the cost of professional services to develop a project, and can also suggest other potential sources of funding.

DETAILS of the 2025 programme of events will be circulated in the next Newsletter. The popular Englefield Lecture will be in the Summer, and we are also arranging a garden visit and a guided tour of the Dean & Chapter Archives and St George's Chapel at Windsor, exclusively for the Friends of Berkshire Churches. The Annual Meeting and church tour will be in late September. The annual Ride+Stride event, which raises funds for the Trust and for participating churches, will be on Saturday 13 September.

## **Grants for churches**

The 'Listed Places of Worship' grant scheme has been in place since 2001, and makes a grant equal to the VAT paid on eligible works to a listed church building. It is effectively the only financial support provided by the Government for maintenance of historic churches, and a key element in funding such projects; last year it paid out about £29 million. The Government has announced that the scheme will continue until March 2026; however, the maximum grant will be capped at £25,000, so that any project costing more than £125,000 will lose out. It is uncertain whether the scheme will continue after 2026 - the DCMS has appointed a consultant to report on its impact, and a Select Committee of MPs is also due to report on protecting built heritage, including funding and practical challenges.

THE Diocese of Oxford was awarded £177,000 by the Church Commissioners' Buildings for Mission Fund, to provide grants for small urgent repairs to church fabric. Projects with a value up to £20,000 are eligible, the grant being typically 50% of the cost; work should be recommended in the most recent Quinquennial Inspection report, and must be completed before the end of 2025. Any Anglican church in the Diocese can apply - there is still **over £100,000** available.



## The House of Good

The National Churches Trust research, applying a wellbeing-based approach endorsed in HM Treasury's Green Book, demonstrated that UK churches together contribute £55 billion in social and community benefit each year, and save the NHS £8.4 billion a year.

The NCT has now developed a free tool which individual churches can use to calculate their social and economic value to their local community. The results will help churches to tell their story, and clearly show to local authorities, to MPs, and to potential donors how much the church contributes to local welfare and wellbeing.

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Andrew Ziminski is a stonemason and conservation expert, whose four decades of practical experience includes repairs to Salisbury and St Paul's Cathedrals, and especially the care of country churches in the west of England. He has also visited a large number of historic churches around Britain and Ireland. His deep understanding of the buildings, their materials and their construction shines through in the pages of this very readable book, as well as his respect for the mediaeval craftsmen and for the sacred spaces they created.

Reading this book is like walking around a building with the author. In 120 entries, each discussing a particular facet of a church building,

its setting and its fittings, Ziminski uses examples and anecdotes from his own experience of working on or visiting churches to explain and illuminate the subject—including many unusual and surprising items that might be found in a church. It is also well

illustrated with the author's own photographs and excellent drawings by his wife and daughter.

Whilst intended for people who are becoming interested in historic church buildings, but who don't have prior knowledge, this book should appeal to anyone who loves churches.

Berkshire Historic Churches Trust was founded in 1983 to help with the costs of maintaining the historic churches, chapels and meeting houses, of all Christian denominations, in the Royal County, and to provide funds towards the provision of the facilities that churches need if they are to serve effectively as centres of their communities.

Since its inception it has given grants towards the costs of repairing or replacing roofs, towers, spires, stonework, windows, heating and lighting and installing toilets and kitchens.

All this costs money. To date we have given grants totalling £750,000 - but this is only a fraction of the costs of keeping our churches in good order, and new requests for help come in every year.

We are most grateful to the Friends of Berkshire Churches who pay a regular subscription to support the Trust.

## Could you support the Trust with a legacy in your will?
